PERSONNEL & TRAINING

The Lindsey Volunteer Fire Department has 34 dedicated volunteers responding at a monument's notice to any emergency in, and around, our community. In 2013, we welcomed a new member, Jordan Nichols.

Throughout 2013, the members of your fire department continued to train and prepare to protect the property and citizens of our district, attending hundreds of hours of training classes. The skills and techniques learned give us the ability to respond to a multitude of emergency situations. Class topics ranged from firefighting, search and rescue, confined space, water and ice rescue, grain silo rescue, hybrid car emergencies, along with many others.

In 2014, the Lindsey Fire Department will be celebrating 70 years of providing fire and emergency services to the community. The dedication of your volunteer firefighters can be seen by looking at the number of years a member serves their community. The average number of years served is 19. This ranges from our longest member at 58 years to our newest member of only 1 year. Below is a list of our current members and the number of service years.

RESPONSE TIME

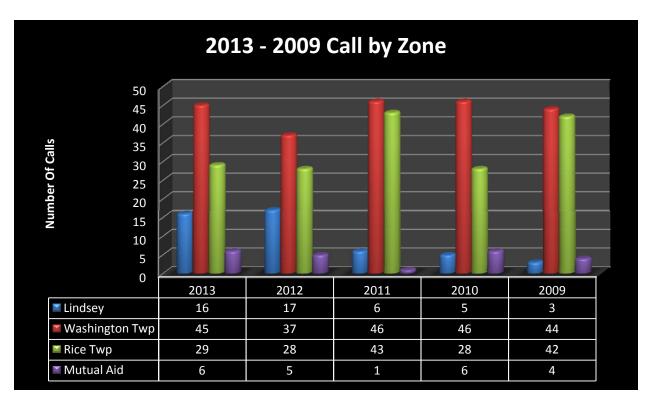
Total Response Time is calculated from two phases of a call. The first is the time between when the pager is set off and the time a fire apparatus leaves the station. The second is the time between the fire apparatus leaving the station and arriving on scene. For 2012 and 2013, the total average response time was 8 minutes, 6 seconds. The chart below shows the two times that make up this number.

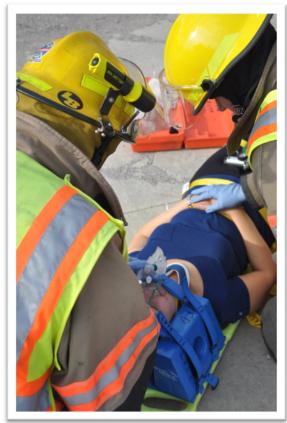

It must be noted, the times listed above are ONLY figured using the first arriving fire apparatus on scene. Many times, by using radio communications, a firefighter may be closer to the scene without first responding to the fire station. When taking this into consideration, the total response time for a firefighter to arrive on scene can be reduced by as much as 2-3 minutes. This makes the total time from when the pager is set off to help arriving on scene less than 5 minutes.

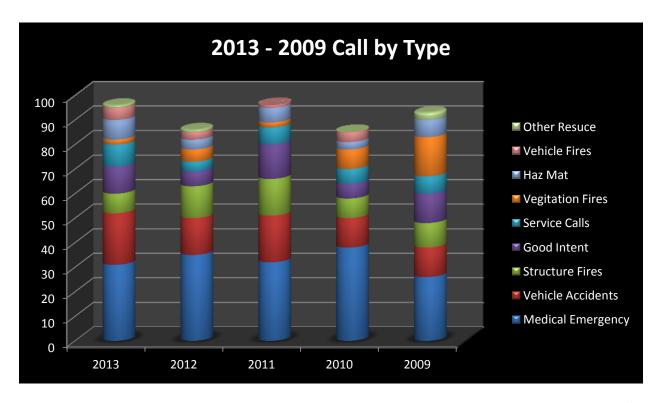


In 2013, Lindsey Volunteer Fire Department responded to a total of 96 calls for help. Over the past five years, the total number of calls equated to 457. Below is a breakdown of the calls by zone:





Below is a bar graph, showing the same 5 year period, broken down by call type. Since 2009, Medical Emergencies, Vehicle Accidents, and Structure Fires make up 64.69% of total calls. It is important to note that of the 34 firefighters, 16 of those are also trained to respond to medical emergencies. Lindsey Fire, at 47%, has one of the highest percentages of firefighters that are also trained to respond to medical emergencies in Sandusky County.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Having the necessary tools, equipment, apparatus, station, and personnel are critical to providing lifesaving emergency services to our community. This requires careful planning of our financial resources not only now, but for future years to come. Since 2011, the Lindsey Fire Department has created a comprehensive annual report to keep all of our stakeholders informed of our financial position.

Income from contracts with Washington and Rice Township are set to expire in 2015. As of now, these contracts generate \$94,600. However, to maintain our current level of services we must continue to increase this amount with contract renewals. As you will read below, and can see in the budget on the following pages, the current amount does not provide the required funding to replace equipment, tools, and apparatus before they must be taken out of service and not replaced. To supplement this funding gap, grants are applied for by the department. With the economic downturn and government funding cuts, many grants are being eliminated and any remaining grants are being drastically cut. Also, departments that previously had never applied for grant funding are now applying which significantly lowers the chances of our department receiving a grant award.

MARCS (Multi-Agency Radio Communication System)

A major expenditure facing our department was the conversion of our radio communication system from the analog county owned system to the digital State of Ohio owned system known as MARCS. The cost of conversation was estimated to be in excess of \$100,000.

In March of 2013, we received an award letter for \$999,028 from The Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program (AFG). AFG is the single largest grant opportunity for fire departments across the United States. In 2012, our department assumed the role of the lead agency to apply for a regional grant to upgrade communication equipment across Sandusky County. Lindsey Fire will be making a complete conversion to the MARCS system sometime in March of 2014. The grant provided 17 portable radios, 17 back-up batteries, 5 truck mounted radios, 1 base radio, a new base radio antenna, and 2 in-vehicle repeaters. Because of this grant, \$100,000 of equipment only cost \$10,000.

In addition, this grant will also allow the other departments that participated to upgrade their equipment. Over \$200,000 in upgrades will also be done in Clyde to make their dispatch



center a mirror image of the Sandusky County Sheriff's Office. In the case that the Sheriff's Office is destroyed, emergency communications can continue, uninterrupted, through the county.

Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA)

Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) is the air pack worn by our firefighters. The majority of the SCBA units we currently have in service fall under the 2007 edition of NFPA 1981. As mentioned in the 2012 Annual Report, 12 bottles must be replaced before 2015 as they will reach the end of their useful life, which is 15 years per NFPA 1981. As of February 2014, the estimated cost to replace each bottle is \$900.

In 2013, however, the NFPA revised standard 1981, which specifies the new requirements that Open-Circuit Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) for Emergency Services must meet. This new requirement made all of our existing packs and bottles obsolete. Replacement bottles and repair parts for our existing packs will continue to be available, but the vendor does not know for how long.

The new packs look similar, but function and design are different. The chart below shows a few feature comparisons.

Turnout Gear

As mentioned in previous reports, turnout gear will continue to be replaced in cycles. Because of new members joining and obsolete gear *(outside the NFPA standard for useful life of 10 years or condition issues)* 4 complete sets were replaced in 2013. Purchased also were 6 sets of extraction gloves, 2 Nomex hoods, 3 pairs of boots, and 4 helmets. The total cost of this gear was \$10,972.22. Repairs to other pieces of turnout gear were also needed at a cost of \$256. A grant was written in 2013, but not awarded, for 5 sets of gear.

FINANCIAL REVIEW (CONT.)

Pumper Replacement

The need to replace our front line pumper is immediate. In 2014, this truck, which was purchased new in 1979, will be 35 years old. Since 2010, the department has had to spend over \$9,250 to fix numerous mechanical problems. New repair parts are not available for this truck, so when repairs are needed used and/or reconditioned parts must be located. This causes an extended delay in repair time taking this truck out of service for up to two weeks. In addition, this truck does not meet current NFPA 1901: Standard for Automotive Fire Apparatus.

After conducting a needs assessment, analyzing the service demands and response capabilities of the new truck, other options are being explored as to the exact specifications of the new pumper. The estimated cost to replace this truck will be between \$200,000 - \$325,000.

A grant request for the 2013 AFG grant program was submitted to replace this apparatus. However, the results from the submission may not be known until late 2014. The requested amount was \$275,000.



Fire Station Replacement

Since 2002, when a building committee was formed, planning has been an ongoing process to replace our existing station. The current building was built in 1897 and was not designed to be a fire station. Recently, LVFD Inc. hired Poggemeyer Design Group to help develop preliminary drawings and an estimated cost. Currently, we are in the process of developing a funding strategy.



FIRE FUND BALANCE

As of December 31, 2013, the fire fund had a balance of \$917,548.29. The balance showing in the 2012 AFG Regional Grant amount is funds from the Federal Government to pay a portion of their 90% share of the regional grant for the first draw for the MARCS Radio equipment. This money is temporarily being held and cannot be used for any other expenditures. Stressing the importance of replacing our 1979 pumper, there is a major allocation of \$47,500 for its replacement.

As presented in previous annual reports, fully funding all allocations for future purchases would require \$108,475 (see bottom table). Since 2010, we have ended the year with only \$36,170 to allocate. This illustrates that there is an average annual funding gap of \$72,305.
